Pedagogy

Our curriculum will be taught through a pedagogy that:

- enables children to reflect on and evaluate their learning
- offer all children a memorable experience within each topic of work

Purpose

These principles are important to our curriculum as they underpin the quality of our teaching and the way our children learn. At the centre of our pedagogy is behaviour (what teachers do), knowledge and understanding (what teachers know) and beliefs (why teachers act as they do).

Enrichment

We will enrich our curriculum by:

- welcoming parents and carers to take part in children's learning and experiences
- holding specialist curriculum days or weeks
- using quality resources in and out of the classroom
- providing on and off-site subject or topic related activities
